Finance- The Village continues to have a solid performance for the month of November. Month to date receipts exceeded expenditures by \$22,802 not including TIF funds and Year to date resulted in receipts in excess of expenditures by \$2,346,110.

Tax receipts for November were \$1,098,533 bringing us to a year to date total of \$15,065,990. Tax receipts in total currently exceed those at this time last year by \$2,024,559. Overall this has been a return to where we started pre COVID in 2019.

Executive Director's Report December 2022

OPERATIONS

- **Farm Shop** Lots of great gift ideas available in the Farm Shop including winter greenery centerpieces, Farm Memberships, Cutting Garden Subscriptions, puzzles, jams, honey, and hand-made crafts. We will continue to have eggs and frozen chicken for sale.
- **Beef Cattle** We have cattle on the farm again. Three yearling heifers are currently enjoying the lower biochar pasture. They will move to the farmyard when temperatures are too low to keep water unfrozen. Five hogs will arrive in April, 2023 and we will have both beef and pork available for preorder beginning in January for an October processing.
- **Holiday Hours** The Farm will be closed December 17, 2022 January 3, 2023

FUNDRAISING

Grants Received -

- **\$90,000 ODNR NatureWorks** grant for a Nature Play Trail in collaboration with the Village of Evendale. Woohoo! Big thanks to David Elmer for his assistance and support! This grant required a match, which is provided through a combination of GHF volunteer hours, \$25,000 in-kind labor/materials from Davey Resource Group, and pro-bono site design work from Dan Frank of EDRK Design.
- **\$25,000 Greater Cincinnati Foundation** grant for an Outdoor Classroom Glade at Soil & Stars. This will benefit both GHF and iSPACE programming. No match was required, but we are applying to the American Dermatology Society for an \$8,000 shade structure, and working with iSPACE to request in-kind asphalt removal by Jurgensen Aggregates.
- **\$9,700 Hamilton County R3Source** grant for a compost and waste sorting education station at Soil & Stars, along with educational signage.

Grants Received -

• \$280,000 EPA 319 grant for improvements to lower watershed and connectivity between GHF and Soil & Stars properties. Awards will be announced in early 2023.

EDUCATION

Professional Development

• GHF Camp Manager, Stefanie Paeg, received a full scholarship to the National Association for Interpretation (NAI) conference in Cleveland, Ohio in December, 2022.

Interpretive Signage

- This is a new focus area for GHF that supports our education mission and engages visitors in a new way, making the site, its history, and what we grow and do here today relevant and meaningful for our guests.
- GHF applied for a grant in 2019 for interpretive signage in the historic farmyard and bank barn. We were awarded this grant in 2020 but experienced delays due to the pandemic. The project is back underway and signage will be installed in the first half of 2023.
- We have received additional funding for interpretive signage from the H2Ohio watershed grant and our most recent Hamilton County R3Source grant, so the next two areas of signage focus will be compost education and agricultural water quality education.

Phi Lambda Pi Report

- Wednesday night activities have included Bunco, pumpkin decorating, and canvas painting.

New Business

- After Hour Rentals
 - > It is increasingly difficult to find staff to work after hours rentals; and most of the Evendale police officers who helped have retired limiting that option. We recently needed one of our front desk clerks to cover it, as no one else was available.
 - > Four neighboring Recreation Centers Kim checked with have also pulled back their after-hours rentals.
 - > Work/Life balance is becoming a greater importance to everyone.
 - > Do we want to be in the rental business? Other options nearby and we have the shelter houses. The enclosed now has eight round tables with 64 chairs.
 - > Options -
 - Raise rental fees to deter rentals? Pay attendants higher rate for working rentals (would require changing personnel ordinance 258). Create a "rental attendant" staff position who could pick up a key, work the rental, and then return the key afterward.
 - > Talk to staff and see what pay it would take for them to commit to working rentals; talk to council and get their thoughts; and neighbors and see how many would be affected by no late hour's rentals.

Village of Evendale Service Department/Engineering Monthly Report December 2022

SERVICE DEPARTMENT

Special Activities of Note – The list of activities for the month are attached, but some items will be pointed out in this section.

- a. Traffic Island Landscape Maintenance Jeffrey Allen has cleaned up the planting areas and planted the winter trees in the urns. We have one year remaining on the current contract, so we will be bidding out the maintenance later next year.
- Miscellaneous projects The crews have been addressing several miscellaneous projects throughout the Village. This will include catch basin repairs, dead tree trimming, Greenbelt maintenance, etc.
 - i. Chipping/Special Pickups –The new chipper has been ordered and we expect delivery by the end of the year.
 - ii. Holiday Decorations All of the street, grounds and building lights were turned on December 1.
 - iii. Street Trees We are working on a list of replacement trees for the replacements. We will be checking on availability for these trees to replace the removed trees.
 - iv. Snow Removal We have been converting all of the dump trucks for anticipation of snow events this winter.
 - v. Safety Task Force The task force will be meeting next week to evaluate past events in 2022 and plan for the 2023 events.
 - vi. Sanitary Sewer at existing Service Department This work will be performed the week of December 12th.
 - vii. EV Station The units are available. We are working with the supplier on some issues that have arisen during charging.
- c. Recreation Center North Roof The contractor has begun the work and will continue with the replacement as weather permits. In addition, we have contracted to have all of the ceiling tiles in the Flex Room replaced.
- d. Traffic Controller at Cooper and Reading We are still waiting for delivery of the replacement parts.
- e. Service Department Storage Building Included at the end of this report is the revised site, building and estimate of probable cost for this work.

ENGINEERING

- 1. Duke Relief Station The station is nearly complete. The fire department will be meeting with Duke over the next two weeks on a tour of the facility to understand the operation and potential of how to handle an emergency.
- 2. Aberdeen Demolition This project has been completed. Cynthia has applied for the reimbursement from Hamilton County for the Redevelopment Grant.
- 3. BTAP Doors and Windows Replacement Project We held the preconstruction meeting for this project and the contractor is working on a delivery schedule. We anticipate this work being performed in late spring.
- 4. Pickle Ball Courts This project shall be rebid after the 1st of the year.
- 5. LED Lights for Pool Richards Electric has ordered the fixtures and we await the delivery schedule. These fixtures will be installed once they arrive and weather permits.
- 6. Wyscarver Road Closure Sharonville has begun a flood mitigation project that begins at the Creek Road dam/reservoir and will extend along the creek to the system at Main Street and Sharon Road. This work will cut off through access on Wyscarver beginning December 12 and lasting for approximately 1 year.
- 7. Alta Fiber We have received plans for running fiber cable for the southern portion of Carpenters Creek from Fawn Run Ct south and include Twilight and Plateau.




