VILLAGE OF EVENDALE, OHIO ORDINANCE # 23-31

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 666, SEX RELATED OFFENSES, TO ADD SECTION 666.23, PROXIMITY OF SEX OFFENDERS' RESIDENCES TO SCHOOLS AND CERTAIN OTHER PROPERTIES; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY

- WHEREAS, both state and federal law require sex offenders to register with various agencies or entities, and impose requirements and/or limitations on registered sex offenders with respect to their residency, notification to parties relating thereto, and prohibitions relative to certain land uses within communities; and
- **WHEREAS,** specifically, Ohio Revised Code Chapter 2950 regulates such persons within the State of Ohio; and
- WHEREAS, the Village wishes to adopt parallel language within its code of ordinances which provide Village-specific enforcement and penalties, authorizes the Village to pursue certain legal remedies within its Chapter 666 pertaining to sex related offenses, and provides specificity as to the manner in which the sex offender laws pertain within the Village;
- BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE VILLAGE OF EVENDALE, STATE OF OHIO, five members concurring, that:
- SECTION 1: The Village Council hereby amends Chapter 666 of the Evendale, Ohio Code of Ordinances, to add Section 666.23, titled, "PROXIMITY OF SEX OFFENDERS' RESIDENCES TO SCHOOLS AND CERTAIN OTHER PROPERTIES," a copy of which is attached hereto as Exhibit A and incorporated by reference herein; and
- **SECTION 2:** All other sections of Chapter 666 shall remain as written; and
- SECTION 3: This ordinance is declared to be an emergency measure by a concurrence of five members of Council, it being necessary to preserve the health, safety, and general welfare of the Village of Evendale, and it is necessary that this measure be put into immediate effect in order for the Village to promptly enforce violations of the law against registered sex offenders and to have all remedies available against sex offender-related infractions, as soon as possible, and to protect the public health, safety, and general welfare within the Village. Therefore, this ordinance shall become effective immediately.

CHAPTER 666 SEX RELATED OFFENSES

§ 666.23 PROXIMITY OF SEX OFFENDERS' RESIDENCES TO SCHOOLS AND CERTAIN OTHER PROPERTIES.

- (A) Residence restrictions.
 - (1) No person who has been convicted of, has pleaded guilty to, or pleads guilty to either a sexually oriented offense as defined by Ohio law, or similar offense from another state, that is not a registration-exempt sexually oriented offense or a child-victim oriented offense as defined by Ohio law, and who under Ohio R.C. 2950.04 must report his or her residence according to law shall establish a residence or occupy any residential premises within 1,000 feet of any school premises as that termed is defined by Ohio law, day care facility premises, playground premises, park premises, library premises, swimming pool premises, or non-school court, arena or athletic field premises, educational facilities hosting programs for persons under 18 years of age. For the purpose of this Section 666.24, such above-described limitation shall be known as the "1,000-foot Restriction." The 1,000 foot Restriction on individuals as described herein shall be measured from the nearest property line of the residential premises occupied by such individual, to the nearest property line of the: school, day care facility, playground, park library, swimming pool, or non-school athletic field premises. The 1,000 foot limitation on individuals as described herein shall include places in Evendale where the 1,000 foot Restriction is

measured from a qualifying place as described above, regardless of whether the qualifying residence or place occupied by such individual described herein, is within or outside of the boundaries of the Village of Evendale.

- (2) All persons required to register under Ohio R.C. 2950.04 shall give notice immediately to the Evendale Police Chief of any new residence so established or occupied within the Village.
- (3) The Police Chief is hereby commissioned by the Council of the Village of Evendale to place upon the Village internet web site the ability for immediate recognition of all individuals residing or occupying residential premises in the Village, or residing outside the Village but within 1,000 feet of a premises within the Village boundaries that meets the description above concerning the 1,000-foot Restriction, who are required to register under Ohio R.C. 2950.04.
- (4) If a person to whom division (A)(1) of this section applies violates division (A)(1) by establishing a residence or occupying residential premises within 1,000 feet of any of the premises mentioned in division (A)(1), the Law Director of the Village or designee, following authorization by Council, may bring an action for injunctive relief in a court of appropriate jurisdiction against such person to enforce the terms of this section.
- (5) No action for injunctive relief may be brought against any person who, prior to the passage of this section, has established a residence that is otherwise legal under Ohio R.C. 2950.031 by virtue of a rental agreement consisting of a lease of residential premises for a term exceeding 30 days until such lease expires.
- (6) No person required to register under Ohio R.C. 2950.04 may reserve, rent, or otherwise use, or be present at recreation facilities belonging to the Village.
- (7) No person required to register under Ohio R.C. 2950.04 may purchase or use an annual or one-time pass to the Evendale Recreation Center.
- (8) A violation of this section 666.23(A) by an individual required to register under Ohio R.C. 2950.04 is a misdemeanor of the first degree.
- (B) Specific premises subject to the 1,000-foot Restrictions. The specific premises subject to the 1,000-foot Restriction in division (A) of this section shall be measured from the outermost parcel line of such premises as indicated within the property records for such premises of record with the Hamilton County Auditor and Recorder regardless of address of record indicated for such premises within County deeds and tax rolls, and such premises are generally described as follows:
 - (1) All school premises as defined by Ohio law within the Village of Evendale;
 - (2) Griffin Park located at Glendale Milford and Wyscarver;
 - (3) All recreational facilities, fields, and parks located at 10500 Reading Rd.;
 - (4) iSpace Learning Center, 10020 Reading Rd.;
 - (5) Private Sports Facility, 10765 Reading Rd.;
 - (6) Landmark Baptist, 1600 Glendale Milford Rd;
 - (7) Gorman Heritage Farm, 10052 Reading Rd.;
 - (8) Kids are Fun Day Care, 9654 Reading Rd.;
 - (9) Summit Park (City of Blue Ash), 4335 Glendale Milford Rd.;
 - (10) St. Joseph Home (City of Sharonville) 10772 Wyscarver Rd.;
 - (11) Cincinnati Classical Academy(City of Reading) 170 Siebenthaler Av.; and
 - (12) any other premises which meets the description of a property subject to the "1,000-foot Restriction" as provided in this section or by Ohio R.C. Chapter 2950, whether such premises is established before or after the effective date of this ordinance, when such premises is added to such map and/or this Section by Village Ordinance pursuant to division (E) of this Section.

- (C) The Law Director or his or her designee shall promptly cause a map to be made of the locations listed in division (B)(1) through (10) of this section, showing the limits of the residency restriction, which shall be posted in the administrative offices of the Village and delivered to the Sex Offender Registration Unit of the Hamilton County Sheriff. Such map shall be updated as necessary to add qualifying premises to the map as provided in division (B)(11), when such premises are added to such map by Ordinance pursuant to division (E) of this Section.
- (D) Should one of the above premises described above change locations within the Village, notice of the new location of such premises shall be posted at the Village Administration Office, the Police Department and the Recreation Center. The Village Clerk shall also cause notice of the new location to be published in a newspaper of general circulation in the Village of Evendale.
- (E) Additional premises which are subject to the 1,000-foot Restriction described in division (A) of this section may be added only by ordinance of this Council.
- (F) If any provision of this ordinance shall be held or made invalid by a court decision, statute or rule, or shall be otherwise rendered invalid, the remainder of this ordinance shall not be affected thereby.

VILLAGE OF EVENDALE, OHIO ORDINANCE #23-32

ORDINANCE PROMOTING FIREFIGHTER-EMT PEYTON OGLE TO FIREFIGHTER-PARAMEDIC OF EVENDALE FIRE DEPARTMENT AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS,

The Village Council hiring committee considered Peyton Ogle for the position of firefighter/EMT on March 14, 2022; and

WHEREAS,

Following such consideration, the Village Council hired Peyton Ogle as a firefighter/EMT via Ordinance # 22-56, which specified that Ogle's first year of employment would be a probationary period during which Ogle would be required to complete certain pre-employment contractual obligations that would be necessary to allow his eventual promotion to a full-time, regular firefighter/paramedic under the terms of the Agreement; and

WHEREAS,

In compliance with the ordinances of the Village of Evendale, the Mayor and Council have agreed Firefighter/EMT Peyton Ogle is eligible for promotion to the position of Firefighter/Paramedic in the Village of Evendale Fire Department and have determined that Peyton Ogle is qualified for such promotion now that he has completed the required course and passed the state testing for the certificate to perform as a Paramedic in the state of Ohio; now, therefore,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE VILLAGE OF EVENDALE, STATE OF OHIO, five members concurring, that:

SECTION 1:

Firefighter/EMT Peyton Ogle is hereby promoted to the position of full-time Firefighter/Paramedic in the Evendale Fire Department. The hourly rate for Firefighter/Paramedic shall be \$26.15, \$65,270.40 annually based on 2,946 hours of work. Said promotion shall be effective with the effective date of 18 May 2023. The permanent promotion of Peyton Ogle is contingent upon the satisfactory completion of a one-year probationary period. If the performance is satisfactory during that one year probationary period, the promotion shall become final. Thereafter, continued employment and status in that position is conditioned upon the employee's maintenance of required certification for fire fighters and paramedics, compliance with minimum required physical standards contained in the Standard Operating Guidelines (SOG) Manual of the Evendale Fire Department and conformance to the Evendale Municipal Code and good behavior.

SECTION 2:

This Ordinance is declared to be an emergency measure by a concurrence of five members of Council, it being necessary to preserve the public peace, order, safety, health or welfare of the Village of Evendale, or to provide for the daily operation of a department or office of the Village of Evendale. It is necessary that this measure be put into immediate effect in order to ensure that the Fire Department has adequate supervisory personnel in place. Therefore, this ordinance shall take effect and be in force immediately from and upon passage.

ORDINANCE APPROVING THE 2024 TAX BUDGET OF THE VILLAGE OF EVENDALE AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE VILLAGE OF EVENDALE, STATE OF OHIO, five members concurring, that:

SECTION 1: Following a public hearing, as required by law, the 2024 Tax Budget for the Village of Evendale, set out in full as **Exhibit 1** to this Ordinance, is hereby approved.

SECTION 2: The Chief Fiscal and Accounting Officer is authorized and directed to forward all necessary and appropriate copies of the 2024 Tax Budget to the Hamilton County Auditor.

SECTION 3: This ordinance is declared to be an emergency measure by a concurrence of five members of Council, it being found to be necessary to preserve the public peace, order, safety, health or welfare of the Village of Evendale, or to provide for the daily operation of a department or office of the Village of Evendale. It is necessary that this measure be put into immediate effect because of the legal requirement to promptly submit the 2024 tax budget to the Hamilton County Auditor and to enable the Village to properly plan its fiscal operations in the coming months. This ordinance shall therefore become effective upon passage.

WHEREAS, the Engineer of the Village has given his approval of said plans for the property to be developed by the property owner; and,

WHEREAS, the plans approved by the Village Engineer appear to be in good order and in compliance with the purposes and intent of Evendale Ordinance 1466 et. seq.

BE IT THEREFORE ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE VILLAGE OF EVENDALE, STATE OF OHIO, and five members concurring that:

SECTION 1: The copy of the plans submitted by KZF on behalf of General Tool, in accordance with Evendale Code Section 1466 and approved by the Village Engineer are hereby attached as Appendix A and made part hereof.

SECTION 2: The Council of the Village of Evendale finds that notwithstanding the requirement in Section 1466.04 of the Codified Ordinances of the Village of Evendale, that such plans be held for 30 days before action by Council public policy justification exists to proceed immediately in order to obtain the benefits of the improvements, the reduction of impervious surfaces and the enhancement of greenspace, landscaping and aesthetic appeal of the site as soon as possible and Council further finds said plans as approved by the Engineer to be well taken and to comply with the intent and purposes of Ordinance 1466 et. seq., and are hereby approved by this Council.

SECTION 3: The approval of Council of these plans shall be conditioned upon and shall not take effect until the filing of the plans with the Building Commissioner and filing of the performance bond set by Council in the amount of \$170,000. In addition, the issuance of the Water Management and Sedimentation Control Permit is conditioned upon Approval by the Building Department of the proposed plans.

SECTION 4: Copies of the plans as approved by Council shall also be filed with the Clerk, the Engineer, the Building Commissioner, the Planning Commission and the County Soil and Water Conservation District.

SECTION 5: Upon the filing of said approved plans with the Building Commissioner and upon the posting of the bond specified above, the Building Commissioner shall issue the appropriate permit to commence the work, etc. as provided by the approved plans. The permit shall be issued until the applicant closes on the lot.

SECTION 6: This ordinance shall not constitute approval for any building or structure.

SECTION 7: This ordinance is declared to be an emergency by a concurrence of five members of Council, being necessary to preserve the public, peace, order, safety, health or welfare of the Village of Evendale or to provide for the daily operation of a department or office of the Village of Evendale. It is necessary that this measure be put into immediate effect because the public safety and welfare require the work commence immediately to promote the renovation of the site and therefore the economic health of the Village of Evendale and reduce the impervious surface area and enhance landscaping of the site at the earliest possible date. This ordinance shall be effective upon passage.

Over the past two years, the Hamilton County Solid Waste Management District (R3Source) has undergone the process of updating its Solid Waste Management Plan (Plan). This update process included numerous public meetings and extensive feedback from a wide range of stakeholders. The Plan is available for review on our website at HamiltonCountyR3Source.org under "About Us."

A public hearing was held on March 14, 2023, and the Policy Committee voted to formally adopt the Plan at its May 1, 2023 meeting. R3Source now asks for your approval of the Plan by taking the following actions:

- 1. Each political subdivision in Hamilton County is asked to pass a resolution/ordinance (sample enclosed) approving or disapproving of the Plan within 90 days of receipt of this letter. Failure to act on this matter within the 90-day time frame will be interpreted as DISAPPROVAL under State law.
- Please use the enclosed yellow self-addressed envelope to return a copy of the resolution/ordinance to our office. Again, the envelope must be post-marked within 90 days of receipt of this letter.

In order for the Plan to be considered ratified, it must be approved by the Board of County Commissioners, the City of Cincinnati (being the largest municipality), and by municipalities and townships representing at least 60% of the population of our solid waste district.

Under the Plan, disposal fees will remain stable, at \$1/\$2/\$1 (\$1/ton for in-district waste, \$2/ton for out-of-district waste, \$1/ton for out-of-State waste). The Plan outlines a budget contingency should annual revenues fall below or above projections and a feasibility study of having a large regional organics (yard and food waste) processing facility. Should that study result in a need to increase fees, that increase would require ratification by Hamilton County communities separate from this yote.

Introduction

Hamilton County R3Source is currently updating its 15-year Solid Waste Plan, as required by the Ohio Environmental Protection Agency. A solid waste plan is a guidance document that a local solid waste district uses to implement programs and initiatives to continually improve recycling and waste reduction within its jurisdiction and reduce the amount of waste going to landfills.

Hamilton County R3Source used a data-driven process to develop landfill-diversion strategies and increase diversion over the planning period. Hamilton County R3Source chose this approach to progress achievable and realistic goals through implementable strategies.

WHEREAS, the council of Village of Evendale has reviewed the Plan Update and has determined that the Plan Update is in the best interests of Village of Evendale and Hamilton County;

BE IT THEREFORE ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE VILLAGE OF EVENDALE, STATE OF OHIO, five members concurring, that:

SECTION 1: Approval of the Plan Update. The Council hereby approves the Plan Update, a true and correct copy of which is attached hereto as Exhibit A.

SECTION 2: Compliance with Open Meetings Law. It is hereby certified that all formal actions of the council of Village of Evendale relating to the adoption of this Resolution were taken in an open meeting of the council/board of Village of Evendale and that all deliberations of the council of Village of Evendale were in meetings open to the public, in compliance with all legal requirements, including Section 121.22, Ohio Revised Code.

SECTION 3: <u>Emergency</u>. This Resolution is hereby declared to be an emergency necessary for the immediate preservation of the public health and welfare of the Village of Evendale; the reason for the emergency being the need to comply with statutory provisions and to proceed with solid waste management policies without delay in order to properly serve the Village of Evendale.

SECTION 4: Forwarding of Resolution. The Clerk is herby directed to promptly deliver, or cause to be delivered, a copy of this Resolution to the Hamilton County Solid Waste Management District.
